The Azim Premji Foundation for Development is focused on Health and Livelihood apart from Education.

Azim Premji Foundation is a not-for profit organization that has been working since 2001 towards making deep, large scale and institutionalized impact on the quality and equity of education in India, along with related development areas. Any large-scale educational change requires significant and sustained effort over many decades and can only be achieved through working at multiple levels as well as on several areas simultaneously. The Foundation today works in 7 states, 1 UT which together have more than 3, 50,000 schools. Within these states the Foundation is present in over 59 districts, almost all of them among the most educationally backward districts. The foundation has a dedicated team of approximately 900 people working in these locations. Key aspects of its work are as follows:

Partnering with Government: Azim Premji Foundation works in collaboration with State Governments and engages with teachers, teacher educators, head teachers, block and cluster level education officials, senior government functionaries and policy makers at the state and national level working with institutions like SCERT's.

		<p>RIE's, NCERT, MHRD etc..</p> <p>State and District Presence: The Foundation has State Offices in the capitals of select Indian states and several District offices within these states, each having dedicated teams. The work of the State and District offices is institutional in nature, recognizing that long-term and consistent engagement is necessary for educational change. They work at the grass root level, closely engaging with the government education system. The range of work they do spans capacity building of teachers, head teachers and other functionaries at the district level and state level. It also involves work on curriculum, assessment, educational leadership and management, policy issues and advocacy.</p> <p>The Foundation initiated work in Health for underserved communities in select geographies in 2022.</p> <p>In Bengaluru, the foundation works in vulnerable low-income settlements and engages in community health work across Health Centres (3) with a lab, pharmacy and access to a general physician.</p> <p>In 2023 work extended to Raigarh, Chhattisgarh, with the Public Health system to support the delivery of services to the community. Now in Ranchi, Jharkhand also.</p> <p>In 2022-23 the foundation commenced work in Livelihoods in Raigarh, Chhattisgarh and Gumla, Jharkhand engaging with relevant stakeholders and the community to promote livelihood opportunities, increase household income, build resilience, reduce vulnerability and improve human, social, and natural capital.</p> <p>In six Districts, schools have been established by the Foundation for the specific purpose of demonstration. These schools provide quality free education to the local community, very similar to the thousands of rural government schools. About 1200 children study in these schools. In addition, 2 centres for out-of-school children with about 200 children primarily, belonging to migrant construction labour families are also in operation in Bangalore.</p>

Does the University provide bridge/ remedial courses to the educationally disadvantaged students?

Student diversity is our strength and challenge. The student group is a diverse group; from 25 states, rural, semi urban and urban, coming from undergraduate disciplines ranging from arts, economic, engineering, management, science and others, with work experience or fresh out of college, different mediums of instructions during their schooling and an almost equal gender mix.

The programs are academically very rigorous and require a lot of engagement (extensive reading, writing, presentations, field work and projects) from students.

Being aware of the challenges - diversity coupled with the academic excellence we pursue - the University is committed to provide support to meet the academic and other development needs of our students. We have several levels and types of support for students to help students realise their potential and succeed. The support mechanisms and initiatives have constantly evolved, based on student feedback, faculty feedback and the nature of the student cohort in each incoming batch. A very brief summary is as under:

Detailed Orientation Program

All students who are admitted to the program go through a two-three-week orientation programme prior to the commencement of the semester. The programme covers various aspects as follows

- Introduction to Social Sciences
- Academic reading and writing skills
- Quantitative skills
- English Language
- Computing skills
- Workshops on prevention of Sexual Harassment
- Policies and procedures, Support available at the University

Summer Programme

The summer programme, offered for UG and PG students is a three-week intensive program, prior to the start of the regular class sessions. It is designed specifically for students from disadvantaged backgrounds, with clearly defined enrollment criteria. The program is anchored by faculty members and broadly covered Communicative English, Academic Reading and Writing, general confidence building measures and improving the levels of texts that students can access effectively. Students doing the summer programme gain the self-confidence required to engage fully with the bachelor's and master's programme.

More than 90% of the students are on Financial Support provided by the University. In many cases, this financial support is the reason many students from very disadvantaged backgrounds can access higher education at our university.</p> <p>The financial assistance covers both tuition and student accommodation (Boarding and Lodging). The details are as follows</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Scholarships covering upto 100 % of tuition, accommodation and food charges. Students on 100 % scholarship get a completely free education. In the Undergraduate program almost approx. 90% of students fall in this category. • Monthly project assistantships to a limited number of students, where students engage in small projects and get monthly compensation to take care of their needs. • Educational loans facilitated through student help desk.

Continued relevance in the social context we operate in, constantly learning from transaction experience, student feedback and teaching faculty self-reflections are key elements of the curriculum review exercise. The review process in place is designed to address this through formal processes and enabling mechanisms.

Formal Process

Curriculum and Pedagogy Committee (CPC) - A dedicated body comprising senior faculty members Registrar is in place. This committee meets frequently, and a significant part of the discussions are oriented towards analyzing the programme as a whole and the individual courses that are part of the program. The CPC initiates action based on inputs received through several feedback mechanisms. The CPC nominates a team of faculty to work on curriculum revisions and make their recommendations. This team carries the responsibility for extensive review of the curriculum from all angles and recommend changes to the CPC. These recommendations are analyzed and approved by the CPC and the final approval for the curricular revisions are done by the Academic Council.

Enabling Processes

In order to ensure that the curricular review process gets inputs and recommendations from different perspectives (Faculty, Students, course level, programme level etc..) we have institutionalized several enabling processes that feed into the formal CPC and Academic Council reviews.

Student feedback: At the end of every semester a formal student feedback exercise is conducted. Students rate each course for content, coverage, to the program, understanding, reading material quality and adequacy, pedagogy, learning experience and workload. In addition, they also rate the faculty teaching the course in terms of their transaction, engagement, feedback quality etc. The student feedback is both quantitative and qualitative and the feedback is shared by individual faculty members as input to the review process.

Faculty Meetings: The programme faculty meet to share their experience with the course transaction and student response to the courses and the program as a whole. This exercise helps each faculty member to get an overall program perspective and identify interlinkages, gaps / refinement necessary to their courses. While minor refinement in pedagogy, readings, assessment etc. are addressed immediately, this process feeds into the overall curriculum review for the subsequent batches.

Fundamental to the postgraduate programmes and curricular choice is the idea that any practitioner in Education, Public Health, Social Sciences, Humanities and Life Sciences cannot meaningfully engage with these domains without a reasonable understanding of the diverse disciplines, their relevance and impact. The curriculum is equally informed by direct, firsthand understanding of the grass root level work of the foundation in school education, with governments and several development organizations in other fields. This has led to a curriculum that marries theoretical and conceptual understanding with practice and emphasizes both.</p> <p>While this foundational understanding is achieved through a set of core courses, a strong basis to learn further and carve out their own specialization is also critical. Therefore, the design of the program specifically provides students with the opportunity to study various fields (called specializations) within the domain in depth through a selection of electives courses is taken very seriously in this programme. At the same time students can opt for a broad spread of electives if they do not wish to take up a specialized area.</p>

Illustratively, the M.A. Education programme is positioned to address the concerns of curriculum and pedagogy, education policy analysis, school leadership, decision making at various theoretical and practical levels, curriculum/textbook development, and capabilities required for development and implementation of specific educational reform projects and programmes, as well as personal qualities to remain concerned for society.

Interdisciplinarity.

Most progressive curricular approaches recognize the value and importance of interdisciplinarity. Here at the university, our curriculum too is in resonance with this approach and therefore courses on Philosophy of Education, Philosophy of Development, Sociology of Education and Development are core courses in the programme that provide the basis for foundational and conceptual understanding. These courses enable students to understand the inherent dependence and linkages. In addition to these fundamental elements, students also need to gain the breadth required to understand the domain in a holistic way.

Modularity:

Given the wide range of engagement possibilities within these domains, it is imperative that students have the choice to specialize further and branch off into different fields. They need the flexibility to devote attention to their area of interest and wide choice as well. This need is accommodated in the curriculum through a design which devotes roughly 50 % of courses to electives. The electives basket offers a choice of numerous courses across semesters of each programme. This modularity and choice enables the students choose from contemporary areas, historical perspectives or specific skill building courses. It is important to note that almost all electives are also interdisciplinary. In addition some courses are open for all students to study thus giving them the flexibility to pursue their choice. Further students can opt for 'general' track rather than a 'specialization' track, thereby designing their own basket of electives from any of the electives being offered. An illustrative list of electives is given below

Flexibility:

Course of Independent Study: The curriculum provides the opportunity for students to pursue a Course of independent study in their final semester. The independent study is expected to give them the freedom to go beyond the syllabus and explore a

topic of their interest in depth. The study must make an independent contribution to the field. It will allow students to demonstrate their ability to be self-directed and uninstructed. They will have the freedom to define not just the topic of their study, but form of the final output and the parameters for evaluation, along with their faculty mentor. While the domains may differ, each independent study demands the same degree of rigor in conceptualizing and execution. This opens up possibilities for them to be creative.

Specialisations: Students can choose numerous elective credits from within a specific area in order to specialize.

Open Courses / Creative Expressions: A well-rounded and balanced curriculum needs to include opportunities for the student to explore areas of human and social interest that focus on themes related to the arts, culture, the sciences, and other subjects of topical interest. We do not view these as "extra-curricular" but as integral to the curriculum. Sensibilities that develop in studying and engaging with these themes are important in general and also in particular in helping the student locating his/her learning in the context of broader human concerns.

The programme therefore requires the student to obtain credits from such 'open courses'. Examples of open courses offered recently include

- Courses in Literature, Poetry,
- Pottery, Wood working, Photography
- Understanding Cinema, Music (Hindustani, Western), Dance forms etc.
- Oral Traditions and Folklore, Courses relating to texts like Arthasashtra, Mahabharata
- Courses on Insects, Trees, Birds etc.
- Courses on Astronomy, Cosmology

Our approach is that academic audit is not a onetime activity but a continuous process that allows for timely and periodic improvement, based on a variety of feedback from students, faculty and others. As an ongoing mechanism, many operational and academic issues and improvement possibilities are brought to the notice of the Program Coordinator and the CPC which meets frequently. These recommendations are analyzed and are implemented by the respective schools/academic administration function as appropriate.

[Received the assent of the Governor on the 23rd January, 2023; assent first published in the "Madhya Pradesh Gazette (Extra-ordinary)", dated the 25th January, 2023.]

An Act further to amend the Madhya Pradesh Niji Vishwavidyalaya (Sthapana Avam Sanchalan) Adhiniyam, 2007.

Be it enacted by the Madhya Pradesh Legislature in the seventy-third year of the Republic of India as follows:—

1. This Act may be called the Madhya Pradesh Niji Vishwavidyalaya (Sthapana Avam Sanchalan) Dwitiya Sanshodhan Adhiniyam, 2022. Short title.

The Chairperson welcomed all members of the Governing Body (GB). Discussions were held on the below agenda items:

3. Updates on:
 - a) The fee determination order for the programs in AY 2024-25 from MPPURC, Bhopal.
 - b) Submission of fee proposal for programs offered in AY 2025-26.
4. Approval for registration of the University campus under FRRO for visiting foreign nationals as researchers, seminars, learning exchange programs, etc.
5. Status of the process of appointment of the Vice Chancellor and the Registrar.
6. Progress of Phase-2 construction of the campus.

Agenda-I: Review and approval of the Board of Management's decisions

A. UG Ordinance amendment

The GB was apprised on the recommendations of NEP-2020, guidelines of 'Curriculum and Credit Framework for Undergraduate Programme' issued by UGC in December 2022.

For necessary amendments in the ordinance at the state level, Madhya Pradesh Private University Regulatory Commission, Bhopal advised the private universities to pass an amendment to this effect by the Academic Council, approved by the BoM and ratified by the GB of the Azim Premji University, Bhopal. The amendment prepared by a team of faculty in alignment with NEP is enclosed as *Annexure-1 and Annexure-2*.

This amendment will ensure the followings:

- I. Uniformity in credit transfer in UG 4-year programs and other norms across all universities, whether public or private.
- II. This ordinance will be applicable from the academic session 2025-26.
- III. Shall apply to the four-year/eight-semester bachelor's degree (Honours) undergraduate (UG) programme, such as Bachelor of Arts (B.A.); Bachelor of Science (B.Sc.); and other similar undergraduate programmes notified by the university.

The Governing Body approved the UG ordinance amendment as proposed.

B. Identification of additional external hostels to accommodate students in AY 2025-26.

The GB was apprised about the status of the limited capacity of the in-campus hostel to accommodate ~340 students and the external hostel near Ayodhya By-pass, Bhopal, run by a service provider, where around 116 students are staying.

In the academic year 2025-26, ~320 students across PG and UG courses are likely to opt for the hostel facility. To manage external hostels in the academic year 2025-26 following is proposed:

- i. Convert the in-campus hostel to a fully female hostel. This will ensure safety and security of the girls' students.
- ii. Continue the existing external Hostel at Ayodhya Bypass for another year.
- iii. Hire two additional external hostels run by the existing service provider as below for a period of 12 months, starting from 01/06/2025 to 31/05/2026, with the possibility of extension based on requirements and availability.
 - a. Vedic Boys Hostel, Khasra no: 308/1, Regal Town Road, Awadhपुरi, Bhopal (84 students)
 - b. R K Boys Hostel, Plot no : 69, Diamond City, Kokta, Transport Nagar, Bhopal (40 students)
- iv. A fourth external hostel named 'Shree Maa Hostel', situated in Vivekananda Colony, Ayodhya Bypass, Bhopal has been identified which can accommodate 60 students. This will be run by another vendor.

The Governing Body unanimous approved the above decisions (from serial A to E) of the Board of Management.

Agenda-2: Year-end assessment

The annual progress report of the University was presented before the GB which included details of the UG and PG programs, classes, assessment, grading, overview and experience from Field practicum for MA Education and MPH students. Details of participation in events Mountains of Life scheduled in the month of December 2024, including Public Lectures, Seminar series etc were presented before the GB.

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The University expenses from October 2024 till February 2025 were presented before the Governing Body. The GB gave satisfactory remarks after reviewing the programmatic progress and financial progress.

Agenda-3: Updates

- a) MPPURC, Bhopal's fees determination order for the programs offered by the Azim Premji University, Bhopal in AY 2024-25:
The GB was informed about the appeal that has been submitted to the Appellate Authority - Secretary Technical Education, Employment and Skills development Government of Madhya Pradesh. After the filing of the appeal a visit was made to the office of the Secretary. It is understood that MPPURC has not responded to the letter given by the Appellate Authority regarding their views on our case. As a follow-up, two letters have been written to the Appellate Authority with a request to hear our case as soon as possible citing reason that the date for submission of fee proposal to the MPPURC, Bhopal for programs offered by the University in AY 2025-26 is approaching.
- b. Status of receipt of interest on the University's security deposit with the MPPURC
- i. The GB was apprised that the University has not received the annual interest on the security deposit amount lying with MPPURC, Bhopal.
 - ii. A letter followed by three reminders have been written to the MPPURC (October 09, 2024, and December 2, 2024, February 17, 2025 and March 26, 2025).
 - iii. This matter was also discussed in-person with the Secretary, MPPURC, Bhopal in the meeting held at Minto Hall, Bhopal on 'Vision India @2047' early this year.
- GB advised to regularly follow-up with the MPPURC, Bhopal on this matter.
- c. Submission of fee proposal for programs offered by the University in AY 2025-26

- Ensure a seamless experience for our visiting scholars and participants in exchange programs.

GB approved the registration that is to be done with the FRRO.

Agenda-5: Appointment of Vice Chancellor and Registrar for Bhopal – As per ACT

The two-year tenure of the first VC of the University appointed under section 17 (5) of the Madhya Pradesh Niji Vishwavidhalaya (Sthapana Avam Sanchalan) Adhiniyan, 2007, and the first Registrar of the University, Bhopal, is getting over on 15 May 2025. The GB was informed that the process for selection and appointment of VC and Registrar has been initiated as per the provisions under the Act and Statutes, and their appointment shall soon be concluded. The GB directed to complete the appointment processes for the VC and the Registrar and instructed that until the new Vice Chancellor is appointed the current Vice Chancellor of the Azim Premji University, Bhopal will continue to hold the position of the VC of the University.

Since the requisite quorum (five members) for holding the meeting of the Governing Body of the Azim Premji University was complete, the meeting was held.

Minutes of Meeting:

The Chairperson welcomed all members of the Governing Body (GB). The agenda points were presented for discussion before the Governing Body. Below are the details:

I. Review of the key decisions taken in the last meeting

a) Academic Programmes:

- i) Action suggested: Move towards making teaching load of twelve credits (12) uniform across all faculty members.
- ii) Status: Efforts have been made to gradually increase the credit load of the faculty members and make it uniform. New faculty member joining the campus, shadows senior members for 5-6 months of joining and later start taking classes jointly and eventually independently. The credit load among senior faculty members ranges from 12 to 18. There is a constant endeavour to make the credit load in the range of 12-15 across all faculty members.

b) Outreach events-

- i) Action suggested: To increase our outreach and to improve students' diversity. Focused and coordinated efforts should be made to work with the Foundation grantee partners. Towards this, organize collaborative events, seminars, workshops etc with universities on matters of national importance on education like NEP, NCF, etc.
- ii) Status: The outreach team members have started meeting the Foundation grantee partners during their regular outreach visits to schools, colleges, universities etc. Partners are either joining the meetings in-person or virtually as per their availability and convenience. During the meetings, the outreach team shares information about the programs offered at campuses, their uniqueness, process of admissions, opportunities thereof, placements, student-life on the campus and get details of the point persons of reputed public schools in their areas. As a

follow-up the outreach team write to them or connect over a phone call or meet them in person during their next visit to share details about our university, courses that we offer and our focus on excellence in education.

- iii) Apart from this, at the University level, a 'Seminar Series' is being planned to reach out to Universities and Colleges running degree courses like Ayurvedic, Nursing, Homeopathy, Pharmacy etc and Public Schools of repute. For this, the subject of national importance like constitutional values, education, health and allied areas are identified on which experts, practitioners or our faculty members are invited as speakers.

The first seminar series was organized on 18 September 2024 at 'Vijyashree Ayurvedic Medical College and Hospital', Jabalpur, Madhya Pradesh. The topic of the seminar was Gender Inequality in Healthcare Challenges and Solutions and the speaker was Dr Manohar Agnani. Around 150 participants who were largely the students pursuing Bachelors of Ayurvedic Medicine from the college attended the seminar. Post the seminar, the list of students with their email ids and contact numbers were shared with the Outreach and Communication team for further tagging with our larger outreach efforts on admissions and communication.

GB approved the BoM decision on fees for the programs offered by the Bhopal campus in AY 2024-25.

3. Mid-year assessment:

Six monthly progress report of the University was presented before the GB which included details of the UG and PG programs, classes, assessment, grading, Field practicum plan for MA Education and MPH students etc. The plan and status of events like Public Lectures and Mountains of Life scheduled from December 4, 2024, were presented for review and feedback.

The GB was informed about the visit of a group of 39 youths from across 15 countries to the Bhopal campus on 24 September 2024. These were People of Indian Origin (PIO) selected by the Ministry of External Affairs, Government of India under their 'Know your India program'. It aims to establish sense of connect and exposure to various aspects of contemporary India's forms of art, heritage, culture, science & technology, economy, innovation, etc. The group was informed about the work that the Foundation does across the country, the courses that are currently run in the University and future plans. They also interacted with students and faculty members.

The University expenses from April 2024 till September 2024 were presented before the Governing Body. The GB reviewed the financial progress against the programmatic progress and found the progress satisfactory.

4. Updates

a) Approval from MPPURC, Bhopal for the new programs starting in AY 2024-25



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GB was appraised that subsequent to the visit of an inspection team constituted by the MPPURC, Bhopal on 4 May 2024, approval to commence the three new courses (BA in English, Economics and Social Science) with 100 seats each in AY 2024-25 was granted by the MPPURC, Bhopal vide their office order number 1579 dated 27 May 2025.

The visit was primarily made to ascertain the adequacy of infrastructure facilities, faculty members and library books for the proposed new programs.

b) The fees determination order for the programs in AY 2024-25 from MPPURC, Bhopal

The GB was appraised that the Fees review / determination order from MPPURC, Bhopal for the programs offered by the University in AY 2024-25 is awaited.

The GB advised to follow up with the MPPURC, Bhopal to release the Fee review / determination order at an early date.

c) Appointment of VC. and Registrar for Bhopal – As per ACT

The two-year tenure of the first VC of the University appointed under section 17 (5) of the Madhya Pradesh Niji Vishwavidhalaya (Sthapana Avam Sanchalan) Adhiniyan, 2007 is getting over on 15 May 2025. As per the Act, a search and selection Committee has to be constituted, an advertisement to be floated, and the VC is to be appointed by the Chancellor from the name (s) recommended by the Selection Committee. A similar process needs to be adopted for the appointment of the Registrar.

The GB approved initiating the process and appointed the Vice Chancellor as Chairperson of the Selection Committee for the appointment of the New Registrar.

d) Student admission details:

The GB reviewed the admissions in UG and PG programs for AY 2024-25. It was shared that this year apart from the University admission process, students have been admitted through CUET and SAT scores.

It was shared that apart from Madhya Pradesh, students from 20 other states with diverse socio-cultural, and socio-economic backgrounds have joined the University under different programs. Details of states and districts from where the students have joined under UG and PG programs were also shared.

The GB advised to increase the diversity of the student cohorts in the next academic cycle.

e) Registrations:



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5. Progress and updates on Phase-2 campus construction:


The GB reviewed the construction progress of phase-2 of the campus against the catchup plan prepared by the General Contractor (GC) to compensate for the delay in project initiation.



Since the requisite quorum (five members) for holding the meeting of the Governing Body of the Azim Premji University was complete, the meeting was held.

Minutes of Meeting:

The Chairperson welcomed all members of the Governing Body (GB). The agenda points were presented for discussion before the Governing Body. Following reviews were done and updates presented.

- One year of the Bhopal campus:** The progress of the University campus was presented over the last year from its date of establishment including updates on admissions in different courses, assets purchased during the period and critical operations of the university. The GB reviewed the three rounds for admissions held so far for the different PG and UG courses. Plan for considering the CUET and SAT scores for the coming academic cycle was also presented.
- Academic Programmes:** Programme wise (PG : MA in Education and Master in Public Health and UG: BA in History and BSC in Biology) summary was presented including semester assessments, student gradings, key highlights of the past semester was shared along with challenges faced. The GB suggested to consider 12 hour per week of teaching hours per faculty. The way forward for the next year academic cycle including curricular, extra-curricular and co-curricular activities, events, seminars, workshops were also presented and discussed.
- Regulatory requirements and membership status:** The status of University's registration with UGC (name updated on website), All India Survey on Higher Education (AISHE), Madhya Pradesh Tribal Affairs & Scheduled Caste Welfare Automation System (MPTAAS), National Academic Depository (NAD), Academic Bank of Credit (ABC) - Students registration through Digi-locker, MPPURC (Student, faculty database and University related information) and e-Kalyan Scholarship yojana of government of Jharkhand.
- Review and Approval of the Board of Management's decisions** which include:
 - **Submission of '9B application'** to the MPPURC for the three (3) new courses (BA in Social Sciences, English and Economics) proposed in the financial year 2024-25 as per the regulatory



requirements under the Madhya Pradesh Niji Vishwavidyalaya (Sthapana Adhiniyam, 2007 Act 17 of 2007. The GB approved (post-facto) the 9b form submission to the MPPURC.

- **Fees proposal submitted to the MPPURC for the academic batch 2024-25:** The Fees proposal for the UG and PG courses for the coming academic year (submitted to the MPPURC) was presented before the GB. The GB approved the proposed fees structure for the UG and PG courses for the academic year 2024-25.
 - **Approval of Bhopal campus budget for 2024-25:** The plan for the campus for the next financial year was presented and discussed. The GB approved the plan.
 - Committees formed at the campus include those as per the UGC norms for smooth functioning the University. These include Prevention of Sexual Harassment Committee (POSH), Anti-Ragging Committee, Disciplinary Committee, Curriculum and Pedagogy Committee, Academic Affairs Committee, Student Life Committee, Admissions Committee, Course Review Committee and IT Steering Committee.
5. **Update on MPPURC 9b Inspection for the three new courses:** A team constituted by the MPPURC comprising of subject experts and academicians as below visited the campus on May 4, 2024. The inspection visit was primarily to see the adequacy of infrastructure facilities, faculty members and library books for the proposed new courses:

The inspection team comprised of:

- Dr. Krishna Singh: Department of English, Indira Gandhi National Tribal University Central University, Amarkantak, MP – Chairperson.
- Dr. Taramani Shrivastava, Department of Social Sciences, Pandit S.N. Shukla University, Shahdol – Member.
- Dr. Harihar Basant Gupta, Prof. of Economics, Institute for Excellence in Higher Education, Bhopal (Excellence College), MP. – Member.
- Dr. Anjusha Tiwari, Department of Commerce, Barkatullah University Bhopal, MP – Observer.

The team interacted with the faculty members, including those for the three new courses for which the inspection was scheduled. Queries of the inspection team responded to their satisfaction. The inspection team was satisfied with the infrastructure, number of faculty members and the books in the library for the three new courses. The approval letter from MPPURC for the three new courses is expected by the end of May '24.

6. **Progress and updates on Phase-2 construction:** The progress and timelines for the construction of phase-2 of the campus were presented and discussed with the Project team and the General Contractor (GC). The Governing Body instructed the General Contractor's team to strictly adhere to the proposed timelines and complete the construction work as per the agreed schedule. In consultation with the GC the Project team will get ready the plans to make up for the time-loss due to unforeseen delays.


The review mechanism developed for the weekly review of the project jointly by the project and operations team wherein daily site visit by user side Project Manager (Raju), weekly site visit by the Registrar (Naveen Das), weekly review of the progress with Manoj and Gautam, fortnightly review with Anurag and senior management team. Once in a quarter, the review will take place on-site with Project team and the GC involving key stakeholder. The GB approved the review mechanism.

7. **Outreach events:** Events planned versus held over last year with various academic institutions like schools, colleges, and universities across the select states were presented and reviewed. The Governing Body emphasised the need for a more diverse student cohort. Suggested to have outreach to schools and colleges across big and medium sized cities. This would require focused approach and coordinated efforts in support from the Philanthropy partners working in and around the select districts. Outreach team to come up with a plan for the same.


It was suggested to have collaborative events, seminars, workshops etc with universities on matters of national importance on education like NEP, NCF etc. The collaboration could be around funding the event at their locations or hosting such events at our campus.



Minutes of Meeting:

The Chairperson welcomed all members of the Board of Management (BoM). The agenda items were presented for deliberation and approval by the BoM.

A. Ratification of the decisions of the Academic Council of Azim Premji University, Bhopal on the following agenda items

1. UG Ordinance amendment
2. Guidelines for courses taught across programs.
3. Faculty Development Plan and its implementation.
4. Guidelines on generated AI and plagiarism

I. UG Ordinance amendment as per Section 10(1)

The BoM was apprised on the recommendations of NEP-2020 and guidelines of 'Curriculum and Credit Framework for Undergraduate Programme' issued by UGC in December 2022 and MPPURC letter number 3168 dated 29 November 2024 with **respect** to the amendment in Section 10(1). Below are the salient features of the ordinance approved by the Academic Council.

- I. To ensure uniformity in credit transfer in UG 4-year programs and other norms across all universities, whether public or private, MPPURC had advised all the private universities to prepare amendments in their course ordinances in the prescribed format. The amendment prepared by a team of faculty in alignment with NEP is enclosed as *Annexure-1 and Annexure-2*.
- II. This ordinance will be applicable from academic session 2025-26.
- III. This ordinance shall apply to the four-year/eight-semester bachelor's degree (Honours) undergraduate (UG) programme such as Bachelor of Arts (B.A.); Bachelor of Science (B.Sc.); and other similar undergraduate programmes notified by the university.

Board of Management approved the proposed UG Ordinance amendment.

2. Guidelines for courses taught across programs:

- i. Academic Council proposed strict adherence by the faculty members in syllabus - Units and sequencing, assessments and grading.
- ii. It was proposed to have flexible approach across Pedagogy and Syllabus (Readings, writing etc). This will allow students to gain understanding and learn using different means.
- iii. Academic Council reviewed and mapped out the timelines for course creation and semester.

Board of Management approved the above guidelines and processes across the programs.

3. Faculty Development Plan and its implementation:

The specific objective of this effort is to articulate the kind of teaching-learning atmosphere in the university and to build an enabling environment where faculty members can dialogue on ideas, experiences, experiments and cross learn from each other.

Dialogues, faculty-led workshops, expert talks and seminars are identified as the modes of engagement. The following themes were prioritized for the faculty development:

- i. Addressing Inclusion and Diversity
- ii. Curriculum Development
- iii. Pedagogy in Higher Education
- iv. Assessments in Higher Education
- v. Balancing teaching, institutional work and research
- vi. Reflections on growth as a teacher at the University
- vii. Faculty well-being and mental health
- viii. Faculty induction (once a semester)

Board of Management approved the Faculty Development guidelines and topics.

4. Guidelines on generated AI and plagiarism

The Academic Council stressed the need for establishing constant checks and balances by the faculty members on AI usage by students and plagiarism. PCs to organize faculty members' orientations in their respective monthly meetings.

Students should also be informed about the same during classroom teachings and through the mentor-mentee meetings.

Board of Management approved the proposed suggestion and process.

B. Identification of additional external hostels to accommodate student in AY 2025-26.

The BoM was apprised about the in-campus hostel's capacity to accommodate ~340 students. Currently, this is fully occupied by UG male and female students and PG female students. Around 116 PG boys are currently staying in the external hostel run by a service provider near Ayodhya bypass.

In the academic year 2025-26, ~320 students across PG and UG courses are likely to opt for hostel facility. To manage external hostels in the academic year 2025-26 following is proposed:





- a) Convert the in-campus hostel to a fully female hostel. This will ensure safety and security of the girls' students.
- b) The existing external Hostel at Ayodhya Bypass will be continued for another year.

- c) In addition, the below two external hostels will be run by the existing service provider for a period of 12 months, starting from 01/06/2025 to 31/05/2026, with possibility of extension based on requirements and availability.
- Vedic Boys Hostel, Khasra no: 308/1, Regal Town Road, Awadhपुरi, Bhopal (84 students)
 - R K Boys Hostel, Plot no : 69, Diamond City, Kokta, Transport Nagar, Bhopal (40 students)
- d) A fourth external hostel named Shree Maa Hostel, situated in Vivekananda Colony, Ayodhya Bypass, Bhopal is being identified which can accommodate 60 students. This will be run by a new vendor.

The Board of Management (BoM) approved the conversion of in-campus hostel to female hostel and to run the proposed external hostel spaces to accommodate ~320 male - UG and PG students.

BoM advised to complete the identification, negotiation and agreement process by mid of May 2025 so that fully functional hostel spaces are ready to occupy by 1st June 2025.

4. Updates on placements of PG students (MA Education and Master of Public Health programs).

This was the first year of placements at the Bhopal campus. The Placement team started planning for the same from March 2024. The support extended by the placement team to the PG students largely covered the followings:

- a. ~60 Informal sessions including one-to-one sessions on improving resume, developing understanding about job description, developing LinkedIn profile, weekly volunteering meeting with Bangalore campus volunteers for cross learning.
- b. 30 Formal sessions on 'Being in Development Sector', Know Yourself, Effective Communication, how to choose your job, Curriculum Vitae making etc.
- c. 13 sessions conducted, featuring alumni across different sectors. Alumni engage in mentoring, professional discussions and strengthening ties with the university.
- d. Pre-placement workshops were organized from 2nd August to 24th November' 2024 to equip students with the skills and techniques required during the placement processes.

The placements at the Bhopal campus were divided into three phases. The first phase was from 20 to 25 January to 2025, while the second phase started from 7 to 22 February 2025. The third phase is scheduled from 28-30 March 2025.

So far, fifty-six organizations have confirmed to participate for campus placements this year. Around 115 students registered for the campus placement. Till date, around 30 MA Education students have got the placement offers. The placement of Master of Public Health students is scheduled from March 27, 2025.

5. Updates on the status of appeal against the MPPURC, Bhopal Fee order for the programmes offered at the University in academic year 2024-2025.

As suggested by the BoM in the last meeting, the team met Secretary, Technical Education, Skills and Employment, Government of Madhya Pradesh on 24th December 2024. A brief about Foundation's overall work was shared with him and took his advice on the matter. Subsequently an appeal was filed with his office on the same day. Till date, we have not heard back in this. The matter is being regularly followed up with his office.

6. Appointment of the New Registrar and Chief Finance Officer for Bhopal – As per ACT:

Regarding the appointment of the new Registrar and Chief Finance Officer, the Board of Management has nominated Professor Ankur Madan and Professor Varuni Bhatia to serve as experts on the selection committee for the Registrar process and Mr. Sridhar and Ms. Bharti Dewan for the Chief Finance Officer process.

7. Approval on deposit of 1% fees collected from students, to the MPPURC, Bhopal.

BoM was informed that the University deposited 1% of the total fee collected from students to the MPPURC, Bhopal within the set date.

In this regard, Rs. 64,696/- (Rupees sixty-four thousand six hundred and ninety-six only) which is 1% (one percent) of the total fees collected from students till 30 December 2024, was deposited to the Bank account of the MPPURC, Bhopal through RTGS/ NEFT. Details were shared with the MPPURC, Bhopal.









1. Changes in credit structure of Common curriculum
 - a. All courses will become 5 credits; exceptions are CRX 1 and 2 (that remain at 3 credits each)
 - b. Students will be streamlined into and of the two Understanding India 1, 2 and 3 (5 credits) courses and to any one course between Public Reasoning or Computational Skills.
 - c. Critical Reading Writing-1 will be dropped from the Common Curriculum.
 - d. Academic Reading and Writing will be taught at Cluster specific manner.
 - e. Common Curriculum is hence 16 credits instead of 15 credits.
2. Changes in credit structure of Disciplinary Major
 - a. Semester 8 had two flexible credit courses. Instead, there are now two major courses and one flexible credit course.
 - b. This increases the total number of courses in the disciplinary major to 14.
 - c. Students exiting the program after 3 years get 70 (out of 130 credits) from the major and those exiting after 4 years will get 80 (out of 160) credits in the major.
3. Changes in credit structure of Occupational Track
 - a. The OT summer field immersion course will move from 5 to 4 credits.
 - b. The total credits in the OT track would therefore be 24.
